

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

THE LESSONS:

The First Lesson: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Clare Bullock Boyd, Lector

Jeremiah 23:1-6: The Prophet explains God's judgment on corrupt leaders, using the metaphor of "shepherds" who failed to care for God's "sheep" (the people of Israel). God condemns these leaders for scattering and destroying the people and promises to gather a remnant, bringing them back to their land. The passage concludes with a promise that God will raise up a new, righteous leader from the line of David—a "righteous Branch"—who will reign wisely and justly, which Christians interpret as a prophecy about Jesus. What is the faithful definition of such "shepherding"? What is entailed in faithful leadership? How do we reflect this?

Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the Lord. Therefore thus says the Lord, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who

shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock, and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. So I will attend to you for your evil doings, says

the Lord. Then I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. I will raise up shepherds over them who will shepherd them, and they shall not fear any longer, or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing, says the Lord.

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely, and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In his days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety. And this is the name by which he will be called: "The Lord is our righteousness."



Epistle: Colossians 1:11-20

Colossians 1:11-20: This passage is often referred to as "the Colossians Hymn". With its majestic description of Jesus as the "image of the invisible", the serious reality of Christmas's "Word made flesh" leaps off the page into one's heart and soul. Emmanuel: God with us: "In [Jesus] all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell..." Looking at the Risen Lord, we see what God calls us to be. The issue is to what extent do our lives reflect this God-life and how is this reflection accomplished in and through us?

May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his

beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.


He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers-- all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all


things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

Gospel: Luke 23:33-43 The Rev. Michael Bullock

Gospeler: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Luke 23:33-43: With the last Sunday of the liturgical year upon us, the day's gospel focuses on Jesus' crucifixion. Additionally, over the last 100 years, this final Sunday of the Christian worshipping year has garnered the title of "Christ the King Sunday". If Jesus is the "image of the invisible God", and if this Sunday's worship focuses on Christ's crucifixion, what does it mean for us and the way we live that the one we follow succumbs to the world's power and life? And to what extent does Jesus' forgiving statement "...for they do not know what they are doing" speak to hope and the place of Godly faith?

When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." And they cast lots to divide his clothing. The people stood by, watching Jesus on the cross; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over him, "This

People: Praise to you, Lord Christ.

is the King of the Jews."

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."





Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.
